CITY ON WATER

- Hamburg lies on the Bille and Alster estuaries to the Elbe
- Alster is an artificial lake, divided into the Binnenalster and Aussenalster
- More than 2,500 bridges span the many canals and streams
- The Elbe flows into the North Sea 100 km to the north west
- The greater Hamburg region has a population of 5 million – but it's a green and attractive area



WORLD HERITAGE SITE

- Built between 1885 and 1927, Hamburg's Speicherstadt is the world's largest warehouse ensemble and has been a UNESCO World Heritage Site, along with the Kontor district and Chilehaus, since 2015

5-STAR HOTEL LOUIS C. JACOB is a genuine part of Hamburg. Located on Elbchaussee, which connects Hamburg city with the sophisticated Blankenese neighbourhood.



THE FAMOUS LIME TREE TERRACE: Created back in 1791 by Daniel Louis Jacques, it's still considered one of Hamburg's most attractive places today. In 1902, Berlin impressionist Max Liebermann moved into Hotel Jacob at the invitation of Alfred Lichtwark, founding director of Hamburg Kunsthalle. He was appointed to paint views of Hamburg, the most attractive of which is right outside the door to his room – the Lime Tree Terrace. The painting is a highlight of German impressionism.



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
